# PLANNING APPLICATION FOR ROSSETT CHURCH SITE

Apex Architecture and Design Ltd. have submitted a Planning Application No P 2024/1360 for a residential development of three detached family dwellings retaining the existing access leading into three separate driveways, with accommodation spread over two and a half storeys. The buildings will have a floor area of 214m² plus integral garage and are to have red facing brick walls, plain roof tiles, half-timbered gables and splayed bay windows.

### ST JOSEPH'S CATHOLIC AND ANGLICAN HIGH SCHOOL

### **Whole School Mass**

Our first whole school Eucharist took place on Friday 18<sup>th</sup> October. The sports hall was transformed into our place of worship with our school motto "The Way, The Truth and The Life" on display.

Over 850 pupils, staff and invited guests were in attendance at our Catholic Eucharist, celebrated by Fr Jaspher Omongo from the Cathedral Parish, who has recently joined our school Chaplaincy team. The pupils raised the roof with the opening hymn led by the school choir and the joy was tangible!

Yr10 pupils performed a short sketch that welcomed us all to celebration with some gentle humour and teasing of the staff! There was quiet reflection as the pupils led us in the Penitential Rite, helping us to recognise our need for forgiveness. Fr Jaspher gave a beautiful homily based on our gospel reading and talking directly to the children, he reminded them that Jesus accompanies them on their way, their path through life.

At the offertory, pupils took time to dress and decorate the altar and bring forward the gifts of bread and wine for consecration, led in procession by acolytes during the hymn "We Come to Your Feast"

Quiet, reflective music was played as pupils who are Catholic received Holy Communion and the pupils who are Anglican received a blessing. We have two whole school Masses each academic year one of those is Catholic and the other Anglican. The closing hymn was a St Joseph's favourite, requested by pupils and all voices were raised to sing "How Great is Our God!"
